CORAL REES

Coral reefs are amazing underwater homes for many sea creatures. There are three main types of coral reefs: fringing reefs, barrier reefs, and atolls. Let's learn about each one!

FRINGING REEFS

Fringing reefs are like gardens growing right next to the shore. They start from the coastline and stretch out into the sea. Imagine walking from the beach straight into a beautiful underwater forest full of colorful fish and corals. These reefs are easy to reach because they're so close to the land.

BARRIER REEFS

Barrier reefs are a bit further out in the ocean. They have a big, deep pool of water called a lagoon between them and the shore. Think of them as underwater walls that protect the land from big waves. The Great Barrier Reef in Australia is the most famous example. It's like a giant city for sea creatures, with lots of different animals living there.

ATOLLS

Atolls are very special. They look like rings of coral with a calm, shallow lagoon in the middle. They start as fringing reefs around a volcanic island. Over time, the island sinks, but the coral keeps growing up and around it, forming a ring. These reefs are usually found far out in the ocean, creating a safe haven for many sea animals.

TEXTURE IN ART
